Math 108 is a course in elementary calculus, with applications in business and other disciplines. The prerequisite for the course is a passing score on the Mathematics Placement Test or C or better in MATH 105 or MATH 112.

The text for the course is **Applied Calculus for Business, Life, and Social Sciences**, by Denny Burzynski, published by xyz textbooks. We will cover the first five chapters. There will be a one-hour exam on each Thursday of the first four weeks. Each of these exams will count for 17.5% of your final grade. The final exam is cumulative. It will be given on **June 16**, from 10:30AM until 1:15 PM. Two tenths of the final grade is determined by the final exam. There will also be homework to hand in, which will determine one tenth of the grade.
